





- Connect with local community partners to talk about what it takes to become a "Dementia-Friendly Community", and take action to make it happen.
- Assist local libraries and other community organizations in obtaining and making available information about current evidence-based resources that include assessment tools and training programs specific to caregivers.
- Collaborate with local partners to provide ADRD training for health and social service organizations that provide telephone help lines and provide techniques on how to identify families earlier in the process and who are best suited to receive consumer-directed services.
- ldentify best-practice training modules, including online training that would be accessible in rural areas.
- ▶ Utilize the Caregiver Resource Line to utilize screening tool to identify caregivers that are best suited to receive consumer-directed services.
- ▶ Utilize Arizona Alzheimer's Task Force partners to identify existing providers that offer educational trainings, assuring those trainings are evidence-based and available in both rural and urban settings
- ▶ Partner with existing providers to conduct trainings for the general public in both rural and urban settings.
- ▶ Identify entities that are currently involved in Care Transition Programs and ensure that those programs encompass ADRD.
- ▶ Develop an evaluation process to analyze service capacity in under-served areas and populations.
- ► Partner with healthcare and social service agencies statewide to promote a "No Wrong Door" approach to access ADRD services.
- Develop new partnerships in the rural areas.
